Hebrew thought emphasizes God's monotheism, covenant, and holiness. The Hebrew concept of God is deeply rooted in the nation's history and experience, emphasizing God's unique relationship with Israel.

In contrast, the Aramaic concept of God, as reflected in the Aramaic Bible, uses the words (Alaha) and (Mar). (Alaha), a singular noun, emphasizes God's unity and uniqueness. (Mar), a title, means "Lord" or "Master," highlighting God's authority and power. Aramaic thought, influenced by Hebrew and Mesopotamian cultures, emphasizes God's transcendence, providence, and righteousness. The Aramaic concept of God reflects a more universal perspective, emphasizing God's relationship with all humanity.

The Greek concept of God, as reflected in the New Testament, uses the words θεός (Theos) and κύριος (Kyrios). θεός (Theos), a singular noun, emphasizes God's divinity and divine nature. κύριος (Kyrios), a title, means "Lord" or "Master," highlighting God's authority and power. Greek thought, influenced by philosophical traditions, emphasizes God's divine nature, providence, and λόγος (logos). The Greek concept of God reflects a more philosophical and abstract perspective, emphasizing God's essential being and attributes.

Despite the differences in the Hebrew, Aramaic, and Greek concepts of God, there are also similarities and shared themes. All three traditions emphasize God's power, authority, and providence. They also share a common concern with God's relationship with humanity, whether it be the nation of Israel or all humanity.

The concept of God in Hebrew, Aramaic, and Greek reflects the unique cultural, historical, and philosophical contexts of each tradition. While there are differences in emphasis and perspective, there are also shared themes and similarities that reflect a common human concern with the nature and character of God.

In Nigeria, where religion plays a central role in our daily lives, almost everyone acknowledges the existence of God. God is seen as the Supreme Being, the creator of heaven and earth, the one who holds all power. The Yoruba call Him **Olodumare**, the Igbo call Him **Chineke**, and the Hausa call Him **Allah**. Despite these different names, one truth remains: God is the source of everything that exists.

To understand God better, we must acknowledge His key attributes:

1. **Omnipotence**: God has unlimited power. He created the world out of nothing (Genesis 1:1) and controls everything in it. For example, think about the sun rising every day. This constant, dependable act reflects God's power and order.

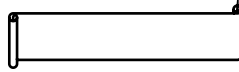

Real-Life Application: Living in the Light of God's Nature

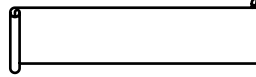

would speak positive affirmations over her life, read motivational books, and, most importantly, pray for God to renew her mind.

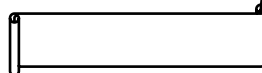
